### HALL OF FAME





Hockeyroos defender and Olympic champion, KATIE ALLEN OAM, was inducted into the South Australian Sport Hall of Fame for 2021.

Allen represented Australia on 182 occasions after coming through the ranks at Burnside Hockey Club, earning the respect of high-flying national teammates with her reputation as a tenacious and hard-working defender. Her playing career overlapped with the golden era of Australian women's hockey through the 1990s and early 2000s, during which she won two World Cups, three Champions Trophies and a Commonwealth Games Gold Medal.

But her most famous victory came at Sydney 2000 where she played in every minute of an eight-game tournament to help the Hockeyroos defend their Olympic title, with a raucous home crowd at their back and the weight of an expectant nation on their shoulders.

Katie Allen joined fellow South Australian Sport Hall of Famers Juliet Haslam OAM (2010), Robert Haigh (2011), Sandy Pisani OAM (2015), Grant Schubert OAM (2018) and Alison Peek OAM (2019).

### Juliet Haslam OAM

In December 2021, Juliet Halsam OAM was inducted into the Hockey Australia Hall of Fame in the athlete category.

An integral player and leader of the Hockeyroos' golden generation that won successive Olympic gold medals in 1996 and 2000, Juliet played 220 international matches and scored 30 goals. Juliet's decorated career also saw her win a Commonwealth Games gold medal, two World Cups and five Champions Trophies. She was named in the Australian Women's Hockey 'Team of the Century' and in 2004 was announced as South Australia's Greatest Ever Female Hockey Player.

Haslam states that her greatest moment was winning the Gold in front of a hometown crowd in Sydney.

Juliet Haslam is one of only four South Australian athletes in the Hockey Australia Hall of Fame athlete category - alongside Robert Haigh (2008), Evelyn Tazewell (2008) and Trevor Smith (2011).

For more than 50 years Roy Dedman's dedication to the sport of hockey in South Australia as a coach, player, umpire, umpire coach, umpire manager and volunteer was recognised and rewarded with Hockey SA Life Membership in 2018.

### **CEO** Report

2021 was a strong year for Hockey in South Australia, given the current environment after a return to sport after a heavily impacted year from Covid. The year saw an increase in participation, record Hookin2Hockey participation, a major sponsorship agreement with Mate, significant government support for infrastructure and a strong balance sheet.

Broader progress towards the ambition set out in "Stronger Together" was achieved and many of the building blocks for a more sustained future. All of this was possible through the collaboration and trust from the Affiliates, and dedication of the Board and Management to be better.

Hockey SA delivered schools clinics to 15,000 school students, which led to close to 400 Hookin2Hockey Program registrations. Standout programs included Port Pirie Hockey Association and Burnside Hockey Club with 50+ participants.

The winter competition commenced with no interruptions and teams bounced back and exceeded pre pandemic levels and in the Metro competitions.

Management secured a Naming Rights Partner to the State Hockey Centre in Mate. Mate also came onboard as the Adelaide Fire's major partner. Mate honoured their sponsorship agreement after the Hockey One season was cancelled.

Secured funding from ORSR to complete the Hockey SA Strategic Facilities Masterplan was a major achievement. Strong liaison with State Government resulted in the successful \$1.5m grant which was announced in early 2022 which is funding the pitch replacement and lighting improvements happening today.

Management continued to run frequent Club & Association forums, to continue to communicate our progress again the "Stronger Together" Plan.

I have personally enjoyed my time spent with the SA hockey community. I'd like to thank outgoing staff Daniel Mitchell, Shauna Baldwin and Matthew Beacroft, the Board, Sponsors and Government for their services and support of Hockey SA. My thanks and best wishes also goes to all Hockey SA Affiliates.

### Presidents Report

Like many sporting codes, Covid had a significant impact on Hockey in South Australia. The impacts of a tough 2020 lead to the development of the Strategic Plan and creating a stronger financial base.

In 2021, Hockey SA was in a position to focus on getting back on a stronger footing by implementing 3 key initiatives –

- Creating a school roadshow growing participation is a key pillar for Hockey SA.
- Collaborate with State Government building statewide facilities for our sport and the community. The Chair thanked all the members who contributed. This gives us a framework to build our sport and build the home for elite hockey in South Australia, with the potential to host International Hockey.
- To recruit Geoff Riddle as CEO after running under a shared model for 2 years (originally meant to be 6 months). It was the opportunity to invest in building a South Australian team and some stability for Hockey in SA.
- A special mention and thanks go to the Club Administration, at all metropolitan and regional clubs and associations, for helping get their club and players through another tough season.
- Hockey One was a major casualty again due to Covid interruptions. It also remains a key pillar for growth in our sport.
- Hockey SA is grateful to the sponsors who supported us, and for remaining with us as we endure these tough circumstances.
- My thanks the entire Hockey SA Board for their contribution and dedication to helping bring stability to Hockey SA.

Anne Collins Hockey SA, Chair 2021 was an exciting year and despite COVID disrupting a number of senior domestic events, athletes continued to train and develop with some normality beginning to return. The Tokyo Olympic come to front of mind, where SASI Graduate Jane Claxton co-captained the Hockeyroos in the Olympic Campaign and ex-SASI and South Australian Kookaburra member Tom Wickham won Olympic Silver.

As well as our graduates representing Australia and despite cancellation of U21 and Development Squad Camps, many athletes warranted reselection in National Development and Junior Squads, following performances in previous events and current commitments to individual development through the SASI training environment.

Miki Spano, Amy Hammond & Lachlan Busiko were selected in the 2021 National Development Squads, whilst Emma de Broughe, Hattie Shand and Fred Gray all re-gained selection in the National Junior Squad. The selection of these athletes in the respective National Squads is a very pleasing outcome for the SASI program and great reward for the athletes who remained committed to individual development through the very challenging years of 2020 & 2021.

On top of the above-mentioned athletes, a number of U18 Athletes were able to compete at the 2021 U18 National Championships and gain selection in the U18 Australian Futures Squads. Emily Cochrane, Lucy Sharman Lily Cazzolato and Mitchell Dell were all worth of U18 Australian Futures selection. The selection of these athletes is confirmation of the hard work and collaboration between SASI, Hockey SA state team staff and the volunteer coaches who work tirelessly to ensure Hockey SA state team and pathway programs are administered, coached and capable of preforming at a national stage.

In October 2021, SASI co-organised and supported SASI athletes in attending the only senior institute event of the year. Attending a series which saw SASI, WAIS & QLD travel to Hobart and compete in a three-team competition with SASI/WAIS, Tassie Tigers & QLD athletes competing for the first time in over a year. The series was hugely rewarding with athletes re-connecting with peers and performing in front of national coaches who attended the event. A fantastic end to the year and an early benchmarking and preparation event for selection camps to be held early 2022. In 2021 SASI welcomed the appointment of new Head Coach, Hugh Purvis who returned to Adelaide following a stint with the Canadian Men's National Team. During the interim period between Tim White's departure and Hugh Purvis appointment, Daniel Mitchell was named interim Head Coach. Daniel lead the SASI program with energy, passion and commitment and supported the SASI athletes to an extremely high standard. The SASI Hockey Program would like to thank Daniel for all of his efforts during in his time at SASI.

All of the opportunities in 2021 came as a result of the athlete's commitment to the daily training environment, hard work and dedication of the staff who work in the program. I congratulate all SASI athletes on their hard work throughout the year.

### **Officials Development**

Many challenges arose in 2021 due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic along with new staff within Hockey SA working to survey the landscape around officials' development within South Australian Hockey.

Through 2021 HSA worked closely with Hockey Victoria to work out the best way forward in overhauling the pathways in place to enable greater development opportunities for officials within South Australia.

In planning these pathways upskilling was required with some of the younger officials within Hockey South Australia which meant Meg Bourne, Jackie Lewis-Gray and Dylan Aird sat their level 1 umpire coaches course held online by Hockey Victoria.

After further consultation through the back end of the season Hockey SA was able to develop an official Pathway Structure to be announced and implemented heading into the 2022 season. Through this pathway, Hockey SA are hoping to be able to create a clearer overview of the pathway from grassroots all the way to officiating at the national level and offer support and development opportunities along the way.

## State Officials

Unfortunately due to the ongoing complications of the COVID-19 pandemic throughout 2021 only the U15s and U18s National Championships were held in 2021.

Although this was the case it was pleasing to see South Australia have officials represent the state at these National Carnivals along with others being named into the U13s, National Country and Masters Nationals before they were cancelled.
